Lepers and Leprosy

- Contagious skin disease
- A punishment for sin
- The leper was "unclean"
- Had to live in isolation
- Had to yell out "unclean, unclean" when coming near people
- God said, do not touch them

- Aaron as High Priest
- Ruth the Moabitess in Christ's family
- Hosea marrying Gomer
- David remained king after his sins against Bathsheba and Uriah
- Peter as lead Apostle
- Paul becomes an Apostle

Problems with Rules

- We only "remember" and enforce the ones we agree with.
- Rules are extremely important when it comes to you but minor when it comes to me.
- Rules can be easily bent.

Problems with Rules

- Rules do not take into account special circumstances, nor do they evaluate things on a case-by-case basis.
- We can treat rules like a list of items that can simply be checked off.

Problems with Rules

- Rules can be followed with a cold heart.
- Rules can be followed without ever causing us to change our thinking.
- Rules are open to interpretation and thereby, open to manipulation.

Rules in general are good, but they are not perfect.

Christianity is not a religion of rules; it is a reconciled, faith-based relationship with King Jesus.
